The pages in this activity guide are a fun way for students to practice asking and answering questions and demonstrate their understanding of key details in a text. CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RI.K,1,2.

She got the idea for this story while sitting in her studio, and she heard a little owl ask WHO.

At present, she has three books of her own, translated into various languages. Lately, she has made some incursions in the animation world.

Little Owl and Little Wolf have so many questions for their parents. "Why can't we move our eyes?" "When will I no longer be a pup?" But owls don't ask "Why?" They ask "Whooo?" And wolves don't ask "When?" They ask "Hooow?" Mom and Dad say it's silly to even consider asking those sorts of questions.

Feeling teased and misunderstood, Little Owl and Little Wolf decide to run away from home for good. After straying too far from the path, the pair discovers that they're lost in the forest and begin to wonder if they've made the right decision by leaving the pack. Little Owl and Little Wolf realize that the only way to make it back to their families is to not be afraid to ask the right questions, their own way.

This heartwarming tale of friendship from author Michelle Garcia Andersen and artist Ayesha Rubio will remind young readers that by staying true to yourself and embracing what makes you unique, good things come to you.

All the forest creatures laugh when Little Owl asks “WHY?” and Little Wolf ask, “WHEN?” Everyone knows owls ask “WHO?” and wolves ask “HOW?”
... But WHY?

Little Owl and Little Wolf love to ask questions. There are six types of questions:

WHO? WHAT? WHEN? WHERE? WHY? HOW?

WHO?

Describes a person or character.

2

WHAT?

Describes a thing or an action.

3

WHEN?

Describes a time, date, or season.

4

WHERE?

Describes a place.

5

WHY?

Describes the reason something happened.

6

HOW?

Describes the way which something happened.


WHEN did this story take place?

My Nocturnal Animal







WHERE did this story take place?
